Climate and Corporate Governance Public Seminar

How Climate Change is Reshaping Corporate Law and Governance: Asian and Global Perspectives

The world has come to recognize that climate change is an issue of global importance, which may turn out to be the issue of this century. Companies are widely seen to be at the core of both the problems and solutions for climate change. This has resulted in a fundamental rethinking of corporate law and governance in Asia and around the world. This seminar aims to illuminate how the global sustainability movement is reshaping corporate law and governance by drawing on cutting-edge research from several of the foremost thought-leaders on corporate law, governance, and sustainability.

Part 1 will focus on watershed global changes that are transforming the understanding of corporate law and governance around the world to address climate change. Although the "corporate purpose" debate is well-known, that the purpose that corporations serve is increasingly determined by laws outside of a corporation's jurisdiction has been largely overlooked. The fact that emerging climate disclosure regulations are poised to transform the dominant understandings of what "good" corporate governance means is also largely unknown. That "acting in concert rules" are preventing shareholder democracy from being an effective tool for addressing climate change is also a hidden reality that requires change. Each of these issues will be explained based on cutting-edge research in this part of the seminar.

Part 2 will examine the interface between directors' duties and climate change. Increasingly, lawyers, judges and policymakers have been grappling with whether – and, if so, how – directors' duties should be altered to address climate change. This part of the seminar will provide a unique opportunity to gain insights from leading corporate law professors from several major economies in Asia on how their countries have been grappling with this issue.

Chulalongkorn University Faculty of Law



Dr. Poomsiri Dumrongvute

Poomsiri Dumrongvute is a full-time lecturer and Vice-Dean for International Affairs and Legal Innovation at Faculty of Law, Chulalongkorn University. He mainly researches and teaches in the areas of financial and securities regulations, corporate law, intellectual property law, and law and technology. He is also a Legal Director of Chulalongkorn University Technology Center where he helps commercializing university innovations through legal supports such as IP, contracts, company structuring, data protection, and other legal and regulatory subjects. Poomsiri received his JSD from UC Berkeley in 2019. Poomsiri has recently found 'Law Clinic for Tech and Spin-off' which is a platform that allows law students to work on legal pain points relating to technology commercialization with an aim to build qualified lawyers to serve Thailand's tech and startup community.



Dr. Sirikanya Kovilaikool

Sirikanya Kovilaikool is an Assistant Professor at Faculty of Law, Chulalongkorn University where she teaches contract law, law of business organizations, international business transaction, and negotiation. She earned her Master's Degrees from University of Michigan Ann Arbor and Georgetown University Law Center, and obtained her J.S.D. from Washington University in St. Louis. Sirikanya is also the Director of the Master of Arts in Economic Laws Program and currently serves as the head of Private and Business Law Department. Her research interests are in the areas of law and economic development and corporate and commercial law with a focus on corporate governance, international business and investment, law of agency, and impacts of socioeconomic transformation on laws and regulations.





Professor Arjya B. Majumdar

Jindal Global Law School

Professor Arjya B. Majumdar trained as a lawyer at the National University of Juridical Sciences, Calcutta and Tulane University, USA. He spent the initial part of his career as a corporate lawyer, advising large MNCs on matters relating to mergers and acquisitions, capital markets, foreign investments into India, joint ventures and private equity. He also advised the Government of India in their disinvestment program. He turned to academia in 2013, joining O.P. Jindal Global University. At JGU, he continues to teach corporate and commercial law, but through the last ten years, he has established himself as an innovative and resourceful higher education administrator, creating and implementing academic, benchmarking and admissions policies for one of India's top private universities. In terms of his research, Professor Majumdar works on M&A, business ethics, CSR and ESG.



Professor Surbhi Kapur

Dr Surbhi Kapur is a trained legal professional with teaching-research interests in areas such as insolvency and bankruptcy laws, comparative regulatory governance, and international economic laws. She is an alumnus of the National Academy of Legal Studies and Research (NALSAR) University of Law, Hyderabad, and Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University (GGSIPU), New Delhi, India. She teaches corporate and allied laws at Jindal Global Law School (JGLS), O.P. Jindal Global University. Prior to joining JGLS, she headed the Centre for Insolvency and Bankruptcy (2021-2023), Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA), Government of India and successfully steered the mandate of the Graduate Insolvency Programme (GIP), a flagship course of the MCA, as the Course Director. Prior to her foray into academia, Dr Kapur worked with the Indian insolvency regulator, the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Board of India (IBBI), High Court of Delhi, Indian Institute of Foreign Trade (IIFT), and Central Information Commission (CIC).





Monash University



Professor Jennifer Hill

Jennifer Hill is the inaugural Bob Baxt AO Professor of Corporate and Commercial Law at Monash University Faculty of Law and the Director of the Centre for Commercial Law and Regulatory Studies (CLARS). Jennifer is an internationally recognised legal scholar in the field of comparative corporate law and governance. Her recent scholarship has focused on governance issues, such as corporate accountability and culture; global shareholder stewardship and activism; directors' duties and transnational legal orders; and executive compensation. Jennifer's work is widely cited in academic literature in Australia, the United States, Europe and Asia.



Dr. Steve Kourabas

Steve lectures in corporations law and related areas. His scholarly intertests include corporations law, financial regulation, and international economic law (including global governance and regulation). He has published on matters regarding prudential regulation, and is currently focusing on the interaction between technology and the corporation with an emphasis on the development of Equity Crowdfunding in Australia and globally. Steve completed his doctorate at Duke Law School. His dissertation explored the development of international financial law after the global financial crisis, with a particular emphasis on the potential to bring international finance law within the international public law regime.



Dr. Vivien Chen

Dr Vivien Chen is Senior Lecturer at Monash University. She teaches corporate governance and social responsibility to postgraduate students, and researches Malaysian and Australian corporations law. Her publications include 'Corporate Law and Political Economy in a Kleptocracy' in the American Journal of Comparative Law and 'Gender Diversity on Corporate Boards: A Law and Social Movements Perspective' (co-authored) in the Journal of Law and Society. She is author of the monograph Self-dealing by Company Directors in Malaysia. Vivien has previously held an academic position at University of Malaya and has been research associate at the University of Oxford China Centre. She is also honorary research fellow for the Australian Research Council Linkage project on harmful financial products, Melbourne Law School, The University of Melbourne.

Professor Andrew Lin

Professor Andrew Jen-Guang Lin, full-time faculty at National Taiwan University College of Law. His research area includes, corporate law, securities law, enterprise and financial law, secured transaction. Other experiences include (1) Director of the Securities and Futures Investors Protection Center (January 2003 to December 2011; January 2018 to December 2023); (2) Public Interest Director (July 2016~June 2019) and Public Interest Supervisor (July 2019~June 2022) of Securities Investment Trust and Consulting Association; (3) Director of Financial Law Committee (2002~2012), Commercial Law Committee, and Director (2010~2013; 2018~2023) of Taiwan Law Society; (4) Member of CPA Discipline Committee (October 2017~September 2020); (5) Commissioner of International Trade Commission, Ministry of Economic Affairs (July 2015 to June 2021; (6) Committee Member of Petitions and Appeals Committee of the FSC (June 2008~ May 2010; June 2022~May 2024); (7) Director of NTU FinTech Center Legal Division; (8) Mediator of SFIPC; (9) Arbitrator.



Professor Christopher Chen

Dr Christopher Chao-hung Chen is currently Associate Professor at the College of Law, National Taiwan University. Dr Chen received his PhD from University of London (UCL). Before 2021, Dr Chen was Associate Professor of Law at the Singapore Management University. Dr Chen's main research interests include financial regulation, derivatives and risk management, financial consumer protection, corporate governance, technology and evolution of legal institutions, and transplantation of law in Asia in broad areas of corporate and financial laws. Dr Chen has published in both English and Mandarin Chinese with publication in the U.S., U.K., Europe, Singapore, Hong Kong, and Taiwan.

Peking University Law School



Professor Kangle Zhang

Kangle Zhang is an Assistant Professor at Peking University Law School in Beijing, China. Kangle obtained the Doctor of Laws degree from the University of Helsinki in 2020. Kangle's research targets the linkages between international law and the economy, focusing on issuing ranging from economic inequality and financial market operations, corporations in international law, environmental protection in economic development, to human right to development. Some of courses that Kangle taught yearly at the University of Helsinki include, Reading International Law, a methodological seminar on critical reading and writing skills, Regulatory Regimes of International Economic Law, and International Financial Regulations. Kangle teaches International Environmental Law, Public International Law and the Theories of International Law at Peking University Law School.





Seoul National University School of Law



Professor Joon Hyug Chung

Professor Chung is an associate professor at Seoul National University School of Law. His research area includes corporate and financial law, with a focus on ESG, M&A, and fintech. He regularly advises the Korean government on corporate law, financial regulation, and competition law. Recently, he led several notable government projects on mandatory takeover bids, share repurchases, dividend frameworks for listed companies, and regulations on public M&A.

He serves as a member of the Sanctions Review Committee of Financial Supervision Services, chair of the Law and Information Committee of the Korea Accounting Institute, and board member of the Clearing and Settlement Committee of Korea Exchange, among many others. Professor Chung practiced M&A before joining academia and was acknowledged as a leading lawyer in Korea by Chambers Global, Legal500, and IFLR. He was selected as "40 under 40" by Asian Legal Business and "Lawyer of the Year" by Legal Times.



Emeritus Professor Kon Sik Kim

Kon Sik Kim is Professor of Law Emeritus at Seoul National University (SNU) and a Research Member of the European Corporate Governance Institute. A graduate of the SNU College of Law, he received his LL.M. from Harvard, and a J.D. and a Ph.D. from University of Washington. Specializing in corporate and securities law, he taught at SNU from 1986 to 2020 and served as inaugural dean of the SNU School of Law. At home and abroad, he published numerous books and articles, which include leading treatises on Korea's capital market law and corporate law. He has taught at such foreign universities as Harvard, NYU, The University of Tokyo and National University of Singapore as visiting professor.



Professor Kyung-Hoon Chun

Kyung-Hoon Chun is a professor at Seoul National University School of Law, where he teaches corporate law, commercial transactions, M&A, and other related subjects. Before joining the SNU faculty in 2010, he practiced law at Kim & Chang in Seoul, Korea, as an associate and a partner in the practice areas of corporate law, M&A, and competition law. He studied at Seoul National University (LLB summa cum laude, Master in Law, PhD in Law), Judicial Research and Training Institute of the Supreme Court of Korea, and Duke University School of Law (LLM cum laude). He has published more than 60 academic articles and book chapters and co-authored several textbooks and commentaries in Korean and English on contemporary issues of corporate and finance law. He currently serves as an active member of various academic associations and government committees in Korea.





Singapore Management University Yong Pung How School of Law



Professor Aurelio Gurrea-Martínez

Aurelio Gurrea-Martínez is an Associate Professor of Law at Singapore Management University, where he teaches comparative corporate governance, financial and securities regulation, and international and comparative insolvency law. He is also the head of the Singapore Global Restructuring Initiative and co-chair of the SMU-Cambridge Roundtable on Corporate Insolvency Law. Before joining SMU, he was a Fellow of the Program on Corporate Governance and a Fellow of the Program on International Financial Systems at Harvard Law School. He has taught, studied or conducted research at several institutions in the United States, the United Kingdom, Continental Europe, Asia, Latin America and the Middle East, including the University of Oxford, Harvard Law School, Columbia Law School, Yale Law School, the University of Cambridge and Stanford University. In 2022, he was also a Visiting Scholar at the Becker-Friedman Institute for Economics at the University of Chicago.



Professor Dan W. Puchniak

Dan W. Puchniak is a Professor in the Yong Pung How School of Law (YPHSL) at Singapore Management University, the Director of the YPHSL Centre for Commercial Law in Asia, a Research Member of the European Corporate Governance Institute (ECGI), and the Editor-in-Chief of the ECGI Blog. Dan is an internationally recognized scholar in the field of comparative corporate law and governance, with a focus on Asia. He has received numerous domestic and international awards for his academic research and teaching — most recently, the 2023 Cleary Gottlieb Law Prize. Dan's research has been profiled in The Economist, The Japan Times, and The Business Times. His research has pioneered the emerging field of intra-Asian comparative corporate law and governance.



Professor Lau Kwan Ho

Lau Kwan Ho is an Assistant Professor of Law at the Yong Pung How School of Law, Singapore Management University (SMU). He is a graduate of the National University of Singapore (NUS) and the New York University School of Law. Prior to joining SMU, he was a Senior Associate at Allen & Gledhill LLP and a Justices' Law Clerk with the Supreme Court of Singapore. He also worked as in-house counsel at the Government of Singapore Investment Corporation (GIC). Kwan Ho is concurrently the Deputy Director of the Centre for Commercial Law in Asia. His main research areas are in contract law and private law. He writes as well on judicial decision making in the common law and on the development of the legal profession. His work is cited by courts in Singapore (High Court and Court of Appeal) and Hong Kong (Court of Appeal), by sitting Commonwealth judges in extra-judicial speeches, by regulatory bodies and in academic treatises and articles regularly. He has given expert evidence on Singapore law in foreign court proceedings.







Professor Lee Pey Woan

Professor Lee Pey Woan is currently Dean and Professor of Law at the Yong Pung How School of Law (YPHSL). She was previously Vice Provost (Faculty Matters) at the Office of the Provost (PVO) as well as Associate Dean (Undergraduate Teaching and Curriculum) at YPHSL and the Academic Director for Faculty Affairs at PVO. As Vice Provost (Faculty Matters), she was closely involved in the review and development of the University's academic governance policies.

Pey Woan teaches Corporate Law but her research interests encompass company, private and commercial law. She has published widely in local as well as leading international journals including the Modern Law Review, Oxford Journal of Legal Studies, Law Quarterly Review, Lloyd's Maritime and Commercial Law Quarterly as well as Journal of Business Law. She has also co-authored text books on Contract Law, Tort Law and Company Law. Her works have been cited by the Singapore Court of Appeal, the Singapore High Court and the Canadian Supreme Court. Pey Woan also serves the legal profession by periodically speaking at legal conferences.

Pey Woan graduated from King's College London and subsequently obtained the Bachelor of Civil Law from Oxford University. She is also an Advocate and Solicitor of the Singapore Supreme Court. In the past, she was appointed *amicus curiae* to the Singapore Court of Appeal and has also been called to the external Bar in England and Wales (Middle Temple).



Professor Pearlie Koh

Pearlie Koh is Associate Professor of Law with the School of Law, Singapore Management University. She was formerly an Associate Professor at the Nanyang Business School, Nanyang Technological University. She graduated with an LL.B (Second Class Upper Honours) from the National University of Singapore and obtained her LL.M from the University of Melbourne, Australia. She is an Advocate and Solicitor of the Singapore Supreme Court. She teaches Law of Business Organisations and Corporate Law. Pearlie's main areas of research are in corporate and commercial law.



Professor Stephen Bull

Stephen Bull is an Associate Professor of Law, Practice, at Singapore Management University, School of Law. Prior to joining academia, he was a partner in the international law firm, where he practised in the New York, London and Singapore offices of the firm. His practice areas included corporate law, mergers and acquisitions, and state privatisations. He teaches and researches in the areas of company law, partnership law, and corporate insolvency and restructuring. He is the reviewer for Partnership Law in the Annual Review of Singapore Law. He is a member of the Working Group for the joint project between the Asian Business Law Institute and the International Insolvency Institute to develop Asian Principles of Business Restructuring.







Professor Zhang Wei

Zhang Wei is an Associate Professor and Associate Dean of the Singapore Management University, Yong Pung How School of Law. He earned his LL.B. from Fudan University, M.A. in Civil Law from Waseda University, LL.M. from Harvard Law School and Ph.D. in Jurisprudence and Social Policy from UC Berkeley. Dr. Zhang specializes in corporate and commercial law, law and economics, and Chinese law. He focuses on quantitative empirical studies of law and the effects of legal system on our society. 

His research and teaching interests include comparative corporate governance, the legal systems and political economies of East Asia (with a particular focus on Japan), and Chinese state capitalism. In addition to numerous scholarly articles, he has co-authored or edited eight books, including Regulating the Visible Hand? The Institutional Implications of Chinese State Capitalism (Oxford University Press, 2016), Beikoku Kaishaho (U.S. Corporate Law) (Yuhikaku, 2009), and Law and Capitalism: What Corporate Crises Reveal about Legal Systems and Economic Development Around the World (University of Chicago Press, 2008). A recipient of two teaching awards, Professor Milhaupt has held visiting teaching and research positions at universities and think tanks around the world. He has served as an expert witness in complex litigation cases in the United States involving foreign state-owned enterprises, as well as investor-state arbitrations before international tribunals. Professor Milhaupt is a Fellow of the European Corporate Governance Institute and an elected member of the American Law Institute. Prior to joining the Stanford faculty in 2018, he served on the Columbia Law School faculty for nearly two decades, where he held chaired professorships in comparative corporate law and Japanese law. He began his professional career with a major corporate law firm in New York and Tokyo. Professor Milhaupt holds a J.D. from Columbia Law School and a B.A. in Government and International Studies from the University of Notre Dame. He also conducted graduate studies in law and international relations at the University of Tokyo.

Professor Royhan Akbar Universitas Gadjah Mada Faculty of Law



A co-authored book with Professor Shen Wei (Shanghai Jiao Tong University KoGuan Law School, China), Incentive Bargaining and Corporate Governance: Comparative Enterprise Law across Three Leading Economies, will be forthcoming from Cambridge University Press.



Professor Zhou Chun Zhejiang University Guanghua Law School

Zhou Chun is an associate professor at Zhejiang University Guanghua Law School. She studied law at Peking University Yuanpei Pilot Program and obtained a Ph. D in law from Peking University Law School. She also holds an LL. M degree from Columbia Law School, where she was granted the James Kent Scholar award. Chun's research interests revolve around business law. She has published extensively in the fields of corporate law, securities law and financial regulations, which included articles in leading Chinese law reviews and chapters of books. Her monograph Principles of Fiduciary Law in the Modern Commercial World was published by Peking University Press in 2021.
